Ask for Help to Keep Your Boat from Sinking

Years ago a great ship was built. They named it the Titanic. They said, "Even God can't sink it."

What a boisterous claim ... don't you think? What a demonstration of confidence! What a show of faith!

Why did it sink? "It hit an iceberg you say." True. "They didn't heed the messages sent to the ship, 'Watch out for the icebergs!'" you add. But I don't believe they're the ultimate reasons.

People died. Why? You say, "There weren't enough life boats!" Why? Because the captain and the builder of the ship (who was on board, by the way) didn't see the great need. They certainly had faith in themselves, but they seemed to lack humility.

It's believed that the name, "Titanic" followed the belief in Greek mythology that "Titans" were powerful gods called the "elder gods" that ruled the earth. A Titan was a symbol of mightiness and power. The White Star Line chose the name Titanic because it was the largest ship in the world at the time of its launching. Would it rule the seas?

On that ship was "The Unsinkable Molly Brown." The Titanic sank ... she didn't. Why?

Could it be that she had a different character and faith? How's your ship sailing? Staying well afloat? Finances well under control? Health stable? Too many friends to be lonely?

Are the waves of life tossing you to and fro? Do you let them? Do you depend just on yourself?

Maybe a character change could help. I get tired of running the ship. I'm not as confident in myself as the builder of the Titanic was. I'm not a Titan or a Titanic. I ask for help ... when there isn't a crisis ... admittedly, more often when there is. But I do ask.

Would you like to know how to keep from sinking? Ask for help.

And, when you ask, be sure that you really expect God to answer, "...because he who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind" (James 1:6). There's plenty of lifeboats where I hang out. We always have extras that aren't occupied or full. God knew there would be a need to rescue us. So He planned well ahead.

Stop by one of our "boat stands" ... and get an unsinkable one.

Our Prayers & Praises:

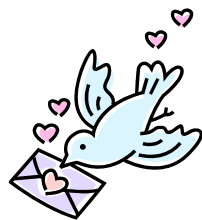

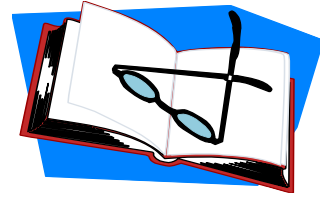

The Meaning of Advent

Advent is the first season of the Christian year and begins four Sundays before Christmas. Advent comes from the Latin word, *adventus*, meaning "arrival." Advent is the season of the church year that we celebrate the first arrival of our Lord and Savior



Jesus Christ and prepare in anticipation for His promised "second arrival." One way we celebrate and prepare is through the lighting of the Advent Candles at each Sunday service and on Christmas Eve. There are many different traditions about the Advent Candles and their meaning. The following is our approach to the Advent Candles:

The Hope Candle is the first candle, November 29th. It reminds us of the universal hope of humanity for a savior, and how in the baby born in Bethlehem, God answered our hopes. **The Love Candle** is the second candle, December 6th. This candle reminds us of the love Mary and Joseph had for their new-born son, and the love God has for each of us. **The Joy Candle** is the third candle, December 13th. As we light this candle, we remember the faithfulness and joy of Joseph and Mary, who trusted God's plan for them. Let us live joyful lives for our Lord. The fourth candle is the **Peace Candle**, December 20th. As we light this candle we ask God to help us to love others as he first loved us. **The Radiant Christ Candle** is lit on Christmas Eve, December 24th. This reminds us of the proclamation of the angel that the birth of Christ brings great joy to all the world. We also rejoice in the Good News that in Christ, God has come to be with us.

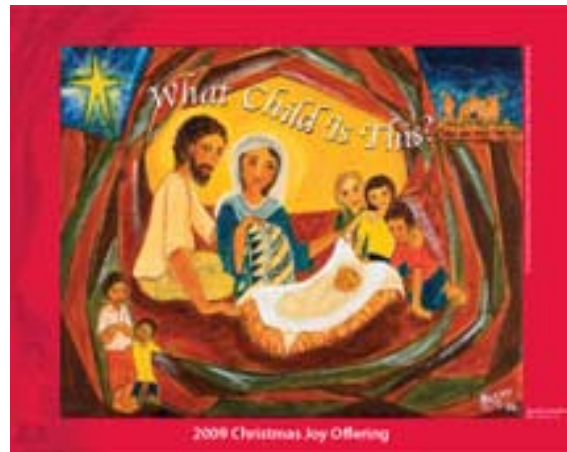
Christmas Joy Offering: "What Child is This?" on Dec. 20th

Bobbie Zellmer 1937-2009

A graveside service is 10 a.m. Saturday at Fredericksburg Cemetery for Markleeville resident, Barbara (Bobbie) Hensleigh Zellmer, 72, who died in Reno on Nov. 28, 2009, after fighting a long battle with metastatic breast cancer. A memorial service will follow the funeral at 1:30 p.m. at Christ Presbyterian Church in Gardnerville.

Born Nov. 12, 1937, in Alamosa, Colo., to John Clyde and Fernola Bonnie Hensleigh, she grew up in Southern California and attended Los Angeles Pacific College, graduating with a bachelor's degree in elementary education in 1962. On Aug. 31, 1957, she married Herman Franklin Zellmer. Her passion was for teaching young children. She worked as an elementary school teacher for 32 years in the Los Angeles City and Hacienda LaPuente unified school districts, teaching in the middle elementary grades.

She retired with her husband to Markleeville. She was a member of the Free Methodist Church. She expressed her faith by sharing her musical talents both as a vocalist and accompanist in the churches she attended. Mrs. Zellmer is survived by her husband; sisters, Linda (Don) Lewis and Judy Hensleigh; sons Craig (Nadine), Scott (Robyn) and Mark (Natalie); and grandchildren Christopher, Breanne, Courtney, Jenna, Aaron, Arielle, Lauren, and Ashleigh.
